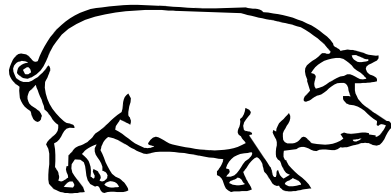

Tau Chi Graduate Helps with Missouri State FIJI Colony

On March 1, 2007, Phi Gamma Delta welcomed its 114th Chapter into existence, the Delta Colony of Missouri State University. Through the efforts of local graduates from across the country and the support and leadership of Kurt Niebuhr, Director of Fraternity Expansion and Field Secretary Dennis Ditulio, eighteen men entered into Pledgeship and will begin an eight-week Pledge Education followed by initiation into Colony membership of Phi Gamma Delta. Following the Formal Pledging Ceremony, a reception was held in honor of the Pledges where they were introduced to the campus. The reception had unbelievable support from the Sororities and I have not reservations in saying that Phi Gamma Delta will make an immediate impact on Greek life at MSU.

The newest members were recruited based on recommendations from Sorority Leadership, Graduate recommendation and Faculty advisement. Kurt and Dennis toiled for nearly six weeks in recruitment efforts to shape this pledge class and insure that our Fraternity would have men of the highest moral and academic standards. Each of the new Pledges has already established an exemplary academic record with a Pledge Class cumulative GPA of 3.24. It was truly an honor to be part of this landmark day in the newest Chapter's history and served as a reminder that Phi Gamma Delta is truly "Not for College Days Alone".

The road to opening this newest Delta colony required a concerted effort that began more than four years ago as International Headquarters identified Missouri State University as a campus to target for colonization. Phi Gamma Delta received permission to begin forming the chapter over a year ago and began to lay the groundwork by recruiting graduate support and input.

Oddly enough, I learned of the expansion from Justin Washburn, William Jewel, '97 at a children's birthday party back in the fall. We realized that we were both Fiji's and began immediately sharing our experiences when Justin invited me to attend a Board of Colony Advisors

meeting to learn more about the expansion to MSU. It did not take long to realize that this would be a great way to become more involved in Phi Gamma Delta and accepted the position of Board Advisor for Risk Management in January.

My responsibilities will be to mentor the Colony President and Social Chairman to insure Phi Gamma Delta's Risk Management policy is woven into the fabrics of the chapter. The BCA (Board of Colony Advisors) will meet monthly with the Colony cabinet as a whole as well as individual interaction with the respective committee members as needed. One of the main thrusts in my role will be to educate not only the Cabinet, but also the Colony, on risk management, liability and develop practices that are consistent with the Phi Gamma Delta's policies.

I look forward to serving our Fraternity and working with a new generation of Phi Gam's. Already I have been rewarded more than I could have imagined and feel privileged to represent Tau Chi in Southwest Missouri.

GRADUATE BROTHER SPOTLIGHTS

MARK INGLE '79

Mark Ingle was born in San Antonio Texas in 1955. He graduated Thomas Jefferson HS in 1973 where he played basketball. He attended junior college in San Antonio before enrolling at TCU. He considered universities such as Texas and Texas A&M but he felt those universities were too large. He wanted a smaller university, which offered the same quality of education as the larger schools. In addition, he wanted to get away from the South Texas Area so Texas was out of the question.

Mark was one of the original members of the Tau Chi Colony. His recruitment consisted of several FIJI brothers from International Headquarters recruiting members of the business fraternity (Delta Sigma Pi) to put a local chapter together. Thus, the founding seven fathers were born. Bill Kramer convinced the founding fathers to start up the chapter. Mark says, "So we all seven were hooked on the FIJI concept and since then we never looked back. There was an empty house next to the Phi Kaps. The fraternity which occupied that house was expelled due to illegal hazing activities."

Although Mark was not an elected officer, since there were only seven members when the chapter stated they all shared in working to establish the chapter. He says "it was a team effort. Without this effort, the chapter would have never happened. Other fraternities did not think we could pull it off. However, we did." Mark was the first member to live in the house and was the only brother in the house the first semester. This was Chuck Stewart's idea. He felt uneasy with seeing the house empty, especially with the Phi Kaps next door.

After graduating TCU with his BBA in Marketing, Mark moved to Houston at a friend's urging and went to work for Getty Oil in the Material Accounting department. During this time he also studied at the University of Houston and earned his BBA in Accounting. Over the last 25 years Mark has worked mostly in the energy industry. He currently works for KBR which is a subsidiary of Halliburton. His job has taken him to Iraq which is where he has lived for the past two years. He says he is growing homesick for America and looks forward to coming home in the near future. Depending on his job options, he plans to settle in Dallas/Fort Worth or San Antonio.

Mark has two children; an 18 year old daughter named Arianna and a fifteen year old son named John. As for what Mark has learned since his college days, he says "Experience is your best teacher—that's the best way you really learn anything in life. If something comes up which you would like to try but are afraid to, take the chance and go for it. You might regret it later down the road for not trying."

Please keep Brother Ingle in your thoughts as he remains in harms way in Iraq.

Steve attended DeLand High School where he played varsity basketball and baseball. When looking at colleges, he considered Wake Forest, Emory, Florida State and a few junior colleges (to play basketball) before choosing TCU. He really liked the size of TCU and the fact that it had a good business school (although he says the business school is much better today).

At the end of Rush Steve received bids from FIJI and Phi Kappa Sigma. "I chose FIJI as a result of the rush efforts of Jon Brookbank, and because several of the guys (Andrew Simon, Dave Minielly, Steve Cornell) who resided near me in Pete Wright dorm were also planning to pledge FIJI.", Steve said.

Steve served the chapter as President, Pledge Educator, Assistant Pledge Educator, and Intramural Chairman. TCU CONSTRUCTION CHANGING THE FACE OF CAMPUS

If you haven't been to campus in a while, you might think it's all happened overnight. But TCU administrators and the hard-working construction crews would likely mention the years of planning and months of physical labor behind this seemingly instant overhaul. With so many physical changes underway, it can be hard to keep up with it all. You can track the progress of the projects at www.tcuphysicalplant.com. Here's a brief rundown of what's happening.

Campus Commons

About 300 students will soon live where no Horned Frog has before. Two of the four new dorms being built in the center of campus will house students starting in the fall, said Craig Allen, residential services director.

The two dorms on the north side of the Campus Commons, whose names have not yet been made public, will be home to students moving in from Clark and Jarvis halls. Clark is closing for a year for renovations and should reopen in fall 2008. Jarvis will be renovated to for use as academic offices and support space. Construction of the other two Campus Commons dorms should be finished by the end of the year.

The other major piece of the Campus Commons project, the Brown-Lupton University Union, should be completed by summer 2008. The 135,000-square-foot facility -- construction of which started in December -- will feature lounges, a TCU heritage center, a copy center, a convenience store, a post office, specialty retail and retail food services (with indoor and outdoor seating), an office suite for Student Government and student organizations and a 350-seat "great hall" with space for films, lectures and concerts.

School of Education Complex

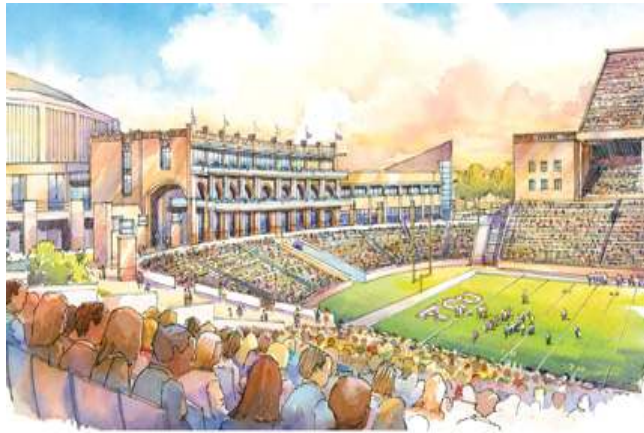
On the south edge of campus on University Drive, the 40,000-square-foot J.E. and L.E. Mabee School of Education Complex should open in time for the start of fall classes.

The complex comprises a renovation of the Bailey Building -- including the restoration of the outside staircase to match the original 1914 façade -- and the 23,000-square foot Steve and Betsy Palko Building. The Palko Building will be connected to Bailey through a two-story enclosed hallway.

Athletics facilities

The stadium where Sammy Baugh, Davey O'Brien and LaDainian Tomlinson have delighted TCU football fans for almost 80 years is about to get a new look, starting with a major addition to and reconfiguration of the south end zone area.

The south end zone project, a timetable for which has not been released because the project has not yet been fully funded, will be an addition to the Walsh Center that extends over the concourse of the south end zone. Amenities will include academic, dining and meeting areas for use by the football team and, for the fans, enclosed luxury suites and club-level seating.

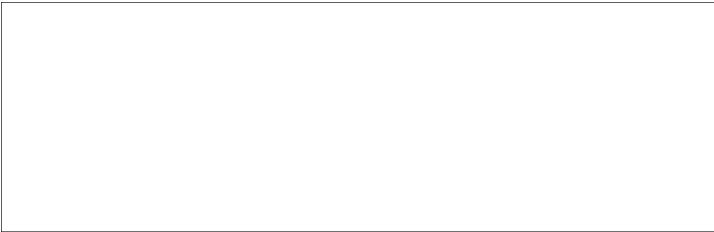
